'GAMLA STAN?' - Stockholm's Old Town — how and when it got its name

The "Old Town" (Gamla Stan) in Stockholm is situated on the island of Stadsholmen. The place where the original "City Between the Bridges" was first built is the historical heart of Stockholm, with medieval streets that encircle the majestic Royal Palace and the cathedral today named Slottskyrkan.

Old Town's name was established by the year

1980. During the period 1926-1980 the name "Staden Mellan Broarna" (The City Between the Bridges) was used, and from middle 1800s to 1926 the name "Den Egentliga Staden" (The Actual City) was used. How confusing could this be for the non-historian reader or a visitor. Prior to the 1800s the name used for the place was "City" or "The Actual City." The name "Nordens Venedig" (Venice of the North) is another popular, but not official name. Whatever name the reader knows, the Old Town is one of the most beautiful and attractive cities to live in, walk in or just visit.

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BIRGER SANDZEN—ONE OF THE GREAT SWEDISH-AMERICAN ARTISTS

For some of us, our introduction to Birger Sandzén was the news that two valuable paintings of his were found in a storage area at Washington High School in Milwaukee. The two paintings, *Creek at Twilight* and *Mountain Symphony*, had been presented to the school by the class of 1927. They were subsequently put up for sale with the proceeds to be used for scholarships.

Sandzén's name has popped up several times recently, mainly because of his long tenure at Bethany College in Lindsborg, KS. A museum built in the 1950's houses a large collection of his works. He was one of a group of famous Swedish artists, including Anders Zorn, who were fascinated by the Midwest prairies and the Southwest rocks and canyons.





Lindsborg, also known as 'Little Sweden,' has a lot to interest us. It was settled in 1869 by a group of settlers from Varmland who envisioned a community rich in culture, learning, religion, business and farming. To tie in with our recent program presented by John Elliott, Lindsborg is the home of Hemslöjd where one can not only buy Dala horses but can watch them being made. It is also where visitors can see the Swedish Pavilion, which was built for the 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis, and was donated to Bethany College.

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
