


Display items – general Sweden




- 1. Dala horse and Kurbits: The style is widely found in the regions of Dalarna and southern Norrland, and today kurbits can refer to the painting of furniture, tapestry, Dala horses, or Swedish folk painting as a general concept. On the Dala horse, a gourd is used to indicate the saddle
- Map of Sweden (Sverige). Population 10.5 million, with 87% living in urban areas covering only 1.5% of land area. Nature in Sweden is dominated by forests and many lakes. Sweden is a highly developed country ranked seventh in the <u>Human</u> <u>Development Index</u>. It is a constitutional monarchy and a Parliamentary democracy,
- 3. Swedish Folk dresses. From left to right: Swedish National, and then Provinces Uppland, Södermanland, Lappland
- 4. A tablecloth showing flowers representing different provinces (landskap) in Sweden.
- 5. Crystal candle holder from Kosta Boda. Kosta Boda and Orrefors glassworks are the most popular manufacturer of Swedish Crystal glassware and artworks. Both companies originated and with headquarter in Province of Småland.
- 6. Swedish Clogs, very common in Sweden to wear clogs made from wood and leather.
- 7. There is an estimated population of **250 000** semidomesticated reindeer in winter herd; approximately 70% is female reindeer.
- 8. The flower representing the province (Landskap) of Uppland is Kungsängslilja, a wild lily growing in area in Uppland close to Uppsala called Kungsängen
- 9. The Swedish Flag. The flag has been used since 1521 and it became very popular during the reign of Gustav I Vasa. The flag in its present form was adopted 1906.

Display items Midsommar



- Swedish Midsommarstång, Maypole with dancers. Celebrating Midsommar, is a very ancient practice, dating back to pre-Christian times. It has its roots in Pagan rituals to welcome summer and the season of fertility. In Sweden, midsummer festivals have been around for at least 500 years. Even in agrarian times, people in Sweden welcomed summertime by decorating their houses and farm tools with foliage and raising tall May poles to dance around. It is celebratred Friday and Saturday closest to Summer Solstice
- 2. Swedish coffee cup, small compared to US cups. Swedish coffee is a strong a flavorful coffee made from Arabica beans, similar to espresso.
- 3. Wooden serving tray, wood used for utensils and trays common in Sweden
- 4. Gräddtårta, Wipped Cream cake with Strawberries a favorite at Midsommar celebration.

Display items Santa Lucia



1. The story of St. Lucia Day. Early on the morning of December 13, a young woman appears, dressed in white and wearing a crown of blazing candles. She is attended by a group of young boys and girls, and brings light into the dark winter at homes, hospitals, schools, and offices, serving steaming coffee with ginger biscuits and saffron bread. The young woman is portraying St. Lucia and this is Luciadagen, Santa Lucia Day, a particularly Swedish festival that has spread throughout Scandinavia.

Story has it that Lucia was born in Sicily to a wealthy family in the year 284, a time when Christians were persecuted by the Roman Empire. She was a young girl engaged to a wealthy man, but instead of marrying she gave her dowry to the poor and devoted her life to Christ. Her fiancé turned her in to the police, she was accused of witchcraft, and was killed on December 13, 304. Her captivating story helped her to become a saint in the Catholic church. Her name, Lucia, was derived from the Latin word lux, meaning light - **a light that brings hope in the midst of darkness.**

- 2. A tradition in Swedish homes, the children bring coffee and Lucia buns and gingerbread cookies to their parent early Lucia day morning, dressed as Lucia and her attendants (tärnor) and Star boys.

Display items Swedish Christmas



- The Advent Calendar, counting days to Christmas. As with other parts of the world, Sweden counts the days to Christmas with an Advent calendar. The idea of counting the days to Christmas from December 1st comes from an old tradition in Christianity, based around the idea of "waiting for Jesus".
- 2. Swedish tray holder
- 3. Swedish Christmas tree (Julgran) with typical Swedish ornaments and candles. The tree is a European or Norway Spruce. Traditionally the tree is decorated with ornaments made from straw and paper, (some with candy hidden inside), a string of Swedish flags, and live candles.
- 4. Christmas tree skirt
- 5. Swedish Christmas Candelabra which can be seen in every Swedish home window during the Christmas season
- 6. Advent Candle Holder. One more candle is lit for each Sunday of Advent.
- 7. Christmas tablecloth.
- 8. The Advent Star is put up at the start of Advent.
- 9. Swedish Julbock, Christmas Straw Goat

Left to Right: Sweden's first King Gustav Vasa, born 1496-1560, he became King in 1523.


Alfred Nobel, chemist & creator of dynamite, born 1833-1896. He established the Nobel Prize.

Ingvar Kamprad born 1926-2018 in Älmhult, Sweden, owner and founder of the IKEA Furniture empire until he died. IKEA is franchised owned today.

IKEA is mostly known for their flat package furniture, meaning you assemble it yourself – always a task with a struggle, but easy to transport.

IKEA is also well known for their deli area for FIKA and their Swedish frozen meatballs!

When it comes to Swedish music, there is of course ABBA, known worldwide, and everyone can sing and dance to Dancing Queen! There are of course many other artists. A lot of traditional Swedish music is played on fiddles and accordions.

Tradition has is that Swedes are attending at least one "Kräftskiva" (Cray Fish Party) a year in August, when crayfish season opens, and beyond. Skål!

In the province Skåne, the Spettkaka (translate to "skewered cake") is very popular. It is being made over a hot fire on a rotating skewer with dripping a sweet egg batter, until layer after layer has dripped and baked to the size of your appetite.




The impressive Vasa Ship built 1626-1628, tragically sank on its maiden voyage in 1628, after less than a mile at sea, leaving over 100 of passengers & crew dead.

The wreck was raised in 1961, and a Vasa Museum was built in Stockholm and opened in 1990. This museum is still a number one tourist attraction.







Volvo Auto-maker is another name associated with Sweden for many years. The first model was made in 1927 at the plant in Gothenburg. The most popular model during the 50's-60 was the PV, and Volvo is still producing - and now you can get the 2024 model at a dealer near you.

In September of 1967, Swedes changed their driving pattern, from driving on the left side of the road to the right side. A major chaos of course, the day it happened, and for weeks to come. Picture taken at 2 AM
